'flowing, etc.',  $sr\`{u}(th)lag$ , sruthlag 'rivulet',  $s(t)r\`{u}ladh$  'swell of sea'; sru- < sruth;  $sr\ddot{u}-$  most likely derive from sriobhall but with possible phonetic and semantic contamination between both sets of forms. Shrule in Ir pl.ns  $< sr\'{u}ill < sriobha(i)ll$  or possibly < sruthail < sruthair 'stream'.
