OIr. *lítech* ‘accused person’ (cf. *liid* ‘accuses’) and Lat. *līs*, *lītis* ‘lawsuit’; also OIr. *ad* ‘law’, *adae* ‘due, fitting, proper’, *adas* ‘suitable, appropriate to’ and Umbrian *arsie* ‘sancte’, etc; OIr. *coll* ‘injury, violation’ and Lat. *culpa* ‘blame’; cf. *-*din-* in *trédenuis* ‘three days’ and Lat. *nundinum* ‘nine days’.
